ANNOUNCEMENTS AND CONCERNS OF THE CHURCH:

- All indications are that we will be asked to forgo public gatherings for most of April. Therefore, we will continue to provide the NKP worship service in this written format. Please consider that a set time (such as 11 a.m. Sunday morning!) and place to read and follow the service provided is the best way to feel connected to our church family and to maintain the discipline of Worship. Suggestions are to follow this service together with your family, your spouse or individually consider it a version of 'house church' (each in our own houses).
- ➤ As you follow this printed service, we invite you to read and meditate on the words. For the hymns and songs, please sing as you are able, or read the words thoughtfully, or listen to the YouTube links of other singers. For Scripture and prayers, read out loud for in hearing your own voice, the words may be more meaningful. Another suggestion, if you are with another person is to take turns to read, especially in places where there are responses, a 2nd voice may also make it more meaningful. A benefit of the written text is that you can also do a re-read which may help you in your learning and in finding comfort and strength.
- This week begins 'Holy Week' on the church calendar. I plan to provide a GOOD FRIDAY service in this same format and it will be emailed to you on Friday morning. After the Good Friday worship, the sanctuary will be open for a Prayer Vigil. This is a time to come to the church alone where you can spend an hour in prayer. You will need to 'sign up' (just call or send me a message) choose an hour beginning at 12 Noon through until 6 p.m. I will

- confirm your hour according to the # who are requesting to have this time for private prayer and meditation.
- > No other events or meetings are at the church in this coming week.
- ➤ The church building has an 'ALARM' installed now, if you have a key to the church, you need to be trained to disarm and arm the system. Call the office for when you can come in to get instructions.
- Sumi & I continue to be in the church office, most daytime hours from Tuesday to Friday. A visit to the church is fine as we can easily see and talk with each other keeping recommended 2-meter distance.

- ➤ One member reminded me that VISION T.V. will be providing many Easter specials during this coming week. You might want to look for 'The Tabernacle Choir' for an evening of inspiring music.

- ➤ It is so very sad that the Christian church will not be gathering together in celebration of the Resurrection next Sunday. We will become more like the early believers; in that we know 'Christ is Risen'! but for fear of a virus we hide in our homes. However, please find ways to declare 'Christ is risen!'
- The Easter Flower Fund will continue to receive donations—it is now called a **SPRING** flower fund and when we have that first Sunday back for communal worship in our sanctuary this Spring, we will have a beautiful flower display to welcome us back. Palm Sunday. It is one of the most important days in the Christian calendar and marks the beginning of Holy Week, immediately preceding the week of events leading up to Jesus' death and resurrection. Palm Sunday derives its name from the palm branches that were waved by the crowds of people and strewn in the path of Jesus as he entered Jerusalem for the Passover riding on a donkey. Sermon Title: 'If the price is right...'

T.V Game shows have long filled the evening hours of T.V. watching. It is generally believed that the viewers, often of a certain age bracket, watch and participate as a way to keep the brain active - for deep in the recesses of grey matter there lies the knowledge to answer the questions, to gain the points, to be the armchair winner. There is a certain satisfaction in knowing the answers, being

the winner – even if it is from your own living room. The longest running game show – its' been on the air since 1956 - is the one called 'The Price is Right'. Every product on the show has an actual retail price, confirmed by a set group of retailers. The game contestants need to guess the price, come close to the price but not go over. The one to do so wins the item. Things have a price, but there's a popular saying that 'everyone has their price'. In other words, everyone can be persuaded to do what you want if they are offered a large enough amount of money. If you follow sports, you are quite aware of this when it comes to inviting, recruiting, persuading a top player to switch teams.

Judas wanted to win. This is the Sunday of the church calendar that goes by 2 titles— Palm Sunday or Passion Sunday. This year the Lectionary focus on 'Passion' and so the Gospel reading from Matthew would have us consider the betrayal of Judas.

Judas.

We know the name. We also know the reputation. And knowing this, who would name a child Judas?

But initially was it not just a name. A name among others who were called by Jesus to be his disciples. That's how we first know the name and the person.

Judas, the disciple whom the Gospel writers always listed last. Mark and Luke both record the list of those Jesus selected to be disciples and who he named apostles – the list goes like this: "Simon (to whom he gave the name Peter), 17 James son of Zebedee and his brother John (to them he gave the name Boanerges, which means "sons of thunder"), 18 Andrew, Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, Thomas, James son of Alphaeus, Thaddaeus, Simon the Zealot 19 and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him."

Judas, maybe listed last - (always the Gospel writers felt the need to identify what he had done)- but not last in his own mind. In fact, Judas probably considered himself the one who was a cut above the rest. Why?

Maybe for 2 reasons – first by where he was from, and second by what was his profession. First – where he was from. He, and he alone in the group of 12, was from the southern part of Judea – closer to Jerusalem, the holy city. Judas grew up where there was a certain sophistication – the 'country cousins' to the north were mere farmers and fishermen. He was from the city suburbs. He possibly had a bit more education and probably had some exposure to things political or managerial or theological – even influenced by the zealots (they were those who were patriotic to a fault, and who wanted more than anything the overthrow of the Romans). We are also quite certain that most of the other disciples knew each other (there were brothers in the group, there were those who shared a trade, and all were from the same neighbourhood, more or less). Judas, however, was a complete stranger.

Besides that, the Galileans (the other 11) spoke with a distinct accent – a point of humour and ridicule by the Judeans. (Comparable to our humour about Newfies!) Judas was indeed more refined, quite self confident and likely a loner, he was the one 'from away'. It is likely he never did fit in.

Still Jesus knew exactly who he was when he hand-picked him to be one of his disciples. Jesus knew all the good points of those he chose, he also knew all their weaknesses. However, Jesus took what we sometimes call a ragtag bunch – they were of every sort- because the kingdom Jesus was initiating would be for every sort. He did not call 11 for a positive purpose and one merely to serve as his betrayer. Judas would learn and grow and change with the rest. But restless he did become – restless because this new kingdom teaching and plan was not turning out as he had hoped. Restless because the prospect of an earthly kingdom was looking less likely and the leader of this new movement was stepping on the toes of the powerful religious and political establishment. Judas was not impressed.

The time seemed so right, as predicted and prepared by John the Baptist, for one to arise as the chosen One of God to bring God's kingdom to earth. Many were eager for the Messiah to come. Evidence and the experiences of seeing Jesus in action began to attract people to become followers and to expect even greater

things. Judas gave himself to the cause and to the leader. He was interested in the person, the prestige, the position and the power. When the Bible reveals to us that he was the treasurer of the group, it does so to tell us that money was important to him. He believed or pretended to believe that money must be directed to worthy causes and to the places of need. You may recall how disturbed Judas was when Mary 'wasted' an expensive amount of perfume by pouring it on Jesus' feet when it could have been sold and the money given to the poor. In such a protest, echoed by the way, by the other disciples, Judas sets the stage for further inconsistences and deceptions to which no one would suspect his true motives. On the surface, it appeared his intentions — and the influence of the master Teacher when Jesus did say the poor should be cared for —was appropriate.

Afterall the monetary value of Mary's jar of perfume was equivalent to a full year's wages. Imagine the sacrificial love that represented as it was poured out as an anointing oil upon Jesus. Hidden behind Judas' protest however is a rising hatred for the one he expected to lead the overthrow of the Romans. The contrast is not missed in the Gospel account – such love by one who was near and dear to Jesus. Such hatred by another who was among his closest friends. And this became the tipping point.

Judas, frustrated that a coup under Jesus as leader was unlikely, he left to meet up chief priests and religious leaders in Jerusalem. He already knew they had been watching and waiting for an opportunity to get Jesus off the scene. There was an increasing number who were aware that the kingdom of Jesus was a kingdom of heart change not political change. They wanted Jesus silenced. Judas, an insider, was in the best position to make that possible.

"What are you willing to give me if I hand him over to you?" he said. Everything has a price. Everyone has a price. To betray Jesus, Judas was offered and accepted 30 silver coins – a mere pocketful of change. That's all the commitment, the 3 years in the presence of the Master teacher, the lessons, the sermons, the miracles, the conversations were worth. Thirty pieces of silver. (In Exodus 21 that same amount was mentioned as the price of a mere slave.)

Up to this point, Judas blended in – even as they gathered to share the Passover meal. Judas reclined at table with the rest of them. Judas watched as Jesus began to go from one of his disciples to the next one, washing each one's feet. Judas listened to Peter's protest and the casual answer "you are not all clean." Judas' own feet were washed by Jesus in this display of servanthood. Jesus revealed his knowledge that one of this inner circle was the betrayer – shockingly to us as we read this account, Judas, maybe faintly, but he too echoes the question "is it I, Lord?"

As the supper progressed, the time had come, Jesus offers the bread to Judas who immediately leaves to fulfill his plan. In his mind, Jesus had failed. Jesus was one big disappointment. Jesus was not who or what he expected from the Messiah. In his soul, well – he had made his decision and he sold his soul to Satan. Betrayal had a cost. And Judas had paid the price. In return he had a pocketful of change.

There is another tidbit about Judas which I didn't share in my introduction to him today. That is about his name – a name we now associate with 'betrayal'. We should think about 'betrayal'. For here we see a most bitter betrayal – it is a betrayal within an intimate relationship. When Jesus called his disciples, he called them to be with him, to get to know him, to become disciples – and yes, he would call them all 'friends', he would pray for them all – including Judas. Terms and expressions of endearment were shared – even by Judas – even at this time.

Jesus called him 'Friend'.

He called Jesus 'Rabbi'.

Still the name 'Judas' has come down through history associated with betrayal. Scripture goes on to tell us that Judas did become remorseful, so much so that he took the 30 silver coins back to the chief priests and elders with the words "I have betrayed innocent blood." But they were unmoved – they had accomplished what they wanted. Judas was alone with his guilt. The tragedy of what he did, and the tragedy of the cross are part of a bigger picture.

And that bigger picture – well one part of it is another tidbit about the name Judas. The name, the reputation, the person.

There once was another game show (no one here would remember it) – it was a radio only show called 'What's my Name?' Contestants had to identity a famous or historical person given a series of clues... top prize for a correct guess on the 1st clue was \$10.

But my last clue for you this morning is another consideration of the name 'Judas'. We need to know that the name Judas is actually a form of the name 'Judah'. And Judah means 'Jehovah leads /'Praise to God'.

The entire Passion story – beginning here today and coming to a conclusion next Sunday - will lead us to indeed conclude 'Jehovah leads' – Praise be to God! Amen.

I am already thinking about our next road trip. Most of you know that Arend & I usually do at least 1 road trip per year. We call the trips 'Explore SK' – and we have a road map where every road we have travelled is highlighted. We are good at stopping when we see... this sign,



not so good at turning off for the rest areas. Because rest for the sake of rest, is just not productive enough. My personal view and

habit has been, that after months of work, I get to enjoy 'no work' and so that's when rest begins. Once or twice a year for designated periods. In between, yes, there's occasionally some mini-rest periods.

The picture provided by Kim for the opening of this worship service reminded me of our recent study trip in Israel. We arrived in Jerusalem on a Friday afternoon. We had just a couple of hours before 'Shabbat' (the Jewish day of rest) would begin at sundown on that day. We checked into the hotel and then took a walk to **Yehuda Market**.













What an experience that was – the crowds, the vendors, the displays of fresh products, the hustle and bustle, and the calls of "come in here", "buy this", many bargains as the hour moved closer to sundown. When we started to walk back to the hotel, we noticed an eerie silence beginning. The sundown hour approached and suddenly the vendors packed up, the shops shut down, the people scattered towards their homes, and even as we walked to the hotel, we noticed less people, less traffic and less noise. In a very short time, all was quiet. Going home, staying home was the expected and accepted routine – and that is the pattern repeated every Friday. The shut down of everything from sundown on Friday until sundown on Saturday seemed to be fully embraced.

Yet it also seemed to be a 'forced rest'. A few of my bus mates and I talked about this in that the culture of western individualism – our rights and freedoms and privileges – how hard this would be to expect, even if not enforced. We could imagine the protest – coming even from our own families. Suddenly though, upon returning from Israel, Covid-19 hit and by Government law we are expected and, in some cases, forced to 'stay at home'.

As Christians, could we not view this as REST? /enforced rest! But not just physical rest — although many of us, probably, are finding some benefit to not being so busy. We could learn from our Jewish friends that REST might be good for our whole way of life. Practical rest, relational rest, business rest — rest from mental weariness, rest from week-day routines, rest even from the things we think are merely leisure — yet drain our energy. Many of us grew up with the experience of Sunday being a day different than the others — a day when stores were closed, or sports events were not held and you were not even allowed to play games or do homework. It was a stay at home, do nothing kind of day. We all have stories and impressions of whether it was good or not.

During my university years I was introduced to the writings of a Jewish Scholar by the name of Abraham Joshua Heschel. He wrote this "the Sabbath was to be a transcendental oasis in time." From creation, God had scheduled a weekly rest for humanity. Sabbath was a gift of grace for humanity. There's a verse in 2 Chronicles (36:21) that says this "Thus the word of the Lord spoken through Jeremiah came true, that the land must rest for seventy years to make up for the years when the people refused to observe the Sabbath."

Exile had messed up the sabbath – the people had become too occupied or preoccupied with discouragement and despair of their plight as captives to stop and observe that 1 day in 7. When restoration came it was for all, people and land and they were to make up for what they lost – primarily they had lost their rest. Maybe this period of isolation could be likened to exile – but maybe we will be better in the long run, if we do not forget the Sabbath – the rest God had always intended for us. We, and the land, and the nations of the world would do better, I believe, if we remembered and valued REST! That's something we can do in these days of forced isolation – or should I say of forced rest!

We pray for Italy, Spain, the U.S., Germany, India. We pray also for our own country – we pray that here in Canada that we will know and support the good efforts of all who are endeavouring to keep us safe. We pray for accurate information to be shared, we pray for the policies and procedures which are put in place will be effective, we pray for those who are at risk whether because of the work they do or because they are susceptible to the disease, we pray for patience as we all adjust to this new way of living. We pray also that we might find good in this – that we might use our time wisely, that we might accept the REST which these circumstances afford, that in Rest and in Confidence we draw closer to YOU. Be pleased, O God, to hear our prayers as we pray also for the concerns on our hearts at this time... (silence)
