


CHILDREN'S TIME:

 A BIBLE VERSE TO LEARN: Acts 17:30b
 "God commands all people everywhere to repent"

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT:



• Last week I showed you a picture of hands and asked you to hold your Mother's hand and thank her for the things she does for you with her hands.



I hope you did that – and I am sure if you did, it made your Mom feel very special on Mother's Day. And also I hope you said a prayer, thanking God for your Mom!

- Today I want to use 'hands' as a way to teach you about our Bible verse. Can you read the Bible verse above or have one of your parents read it aloud for you?
- The important word in that Bible verse is 'repent'.
- The pictures above of hands can help us understand 'repent'. The first picture is of hands firmly clasped together – please put your hands together like that. Think of this picture like you and Jesus together – Jesus loves you and wants to have a close relationship with you – so the picture can be just like you and Jesus holding hands with each other. The second picture shows fists – we make a fist with our hands when we are angry or upset – and that picture is like when we do something wrong. We disobey Jesus – we do something Jesus told us not to do. So, the second picture shows us that we break away from Jesus. The third picture shows hands that are folded in prayer. When we are sorry for disobeying Jesus, we can pray and ask God to forgive us – that is what the Bible verse calls 'repent'. We say we are sorry. The Bible verse says that everyone has to repent – because everyone disobeys Jesus sometimes. Then, the last picture shows the hands back together again. That means God forgives us and we are back to having a really close relationship with Jesus again. Pretty cool, eh? I hope you will remember what repent means by this illustration with your hands!

SOMETHING TO DO:

• A Game to Play.

This game is called 'REPENT'. For this game you will need to remember that the word 'repent' also means 'turn around'.

Your Mom or Dad will need to be the leader.

You start the game standing close to your parents – then

you turn away from them and walk or run or crawl or sneak away.

Your Mom or Dad will then call out "I love you! Repent!"

When you hear those words, turn around and run as fast as you can back to the open arms of your Mom or Dad.

This game will remind you that God, your Heavenly Father calls you to repent and come home quickly to His arms where He tells you of His love and forgiveness.

He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹ in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰ who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. ²¹ And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²² who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.



SERMON: 'Harm & Hope'

Quite a long time ago, I was very happy to be in attendance at the graduation ceremony of my close friend Lois from the McMaster School of Medicine. I recall that the graduating doctors took an oath – some variation of what is popularly called the 'Hippocratic oath'. The internet tells me that there are variations from one medical school to another of that oath and the promises contained in it – but a common understanding of one part is the promise "to do no harm" (the Latin being "primum non nocere").

What exactly does that mean? Essentially it means do only what is good for another, do what is to the benefit of another, contribute to their welfare. Since we contribute this phrase to doctors, it is somewhat comforting to know that when we are under the care of a doctor, they are recommending and offering treatments, surgeries, etc. that are only for our benefit! However, if one was to be extremely literal in this 'no harm' directive and if one, like myself, bruises easily - then something as simple as a blood test often results in 'harm' – in that I can be black & blue as result! 'No harm' must be put in a context of the potential benefits. And surely a blood test ordered by my Dr. would be to my benefit!

Harm may come even if the intention was good. We are disciples of Jesus Christ, followers of 'the Way' and as such we expect the good and blessed life – and for most of us that means no suffering, no persecution, no harm will come to us. Furthermore, we'd like to think that we are thoughtful and careful such that we would do no harm to others – either intentional or unintentional.

Peter writes to believers about **'suffering for doing what is right'** in other words experiencing something hard for the benefit of something good. The early church was greatly persecuted and Peter prepares and warns believers to be ready for personal suffering. In other words, being willing to put yourself in 'harms way' so that the Gospel would be taught, preached, expanded and authenticated. It's hard to imagine what that would look like.

We live in a country that allows for and values many rights and freedoms – including the freedom to believe in Jesus Christ, to worship and to live out that faith in our private lives. Until quite recently, many of the policies and decisions that affected public life here in Canada were also derived from Christian faith, thankfully some still are - but in an increasing secular society that is less so. However, I found it interesting that when the coronavirus made it necessary for governments to place limits on public gatherings, churches were identified to be part of that restriction. Previously and publicly it seemed that churches were seldom noticed and/or barely ever mentioned in policies and announcements. Although our Canadian constitution does not specifically say so – there is a common belief that church and state are separate when it comes to policy and practice. But now in this Coronavirus time, churches were noticed and spoken of publicly. They were noticed for the fact that in churches people gathered, often in guite large numbers and therefore it became necessary to mention that churches could not remain open. In one of the Q & A with gov't officials I listened to this past week, I heard the comment that churches were never told to close but just to limit the number of people who could gather. At the very beginning those limits were 5, then corrected to be 10 – and then with all the stay home policies, it was correctly assumed that any non-family/household gatherings were to be suspended. In the gradual re-opening that is happening, little public attention is given to churches. We will need to observe the openings regarding spaces and numbers and probably come to our own conclusions – especially around 'no harm' as it would relate to our re-gathering.

As Peter prepares the early believers to stand up for the faith publicly, he knew full well the context of the society under Roman control. The prominent belief was that there could be no 'Lord' except Caesar. Those who believed otherwise, you taught otherwise, who lived in loyalty and in love for Jesus Christ would suffer for this belief and practice. But Peter says – "if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed."

Good or blessing will come from the harm when you are silenced or ridiculed.

This word blessed is the same word used by Jesus in Matthew 5 where He said, "Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." The word blessed literally means "lengthened" or "enlarged". It conveys not only the meaning of happy, but a big and full heart (an enlarged heart!). It is also a sense of being honoured by God. Those who suffer because of their righteousness, for

doing what is right, will be blessed by God. Your heart will be full of God's honour and pleasure.

Then Peter made an interesting statement. "Do not fear what they fear, do not be intimidated." (vs.14) Harm can be more than physical – for to those to whom Peter wrote, some were in physical danger but many were in spiritual and emotional danger. The Christian believers were out and about doing good – their faith compelled them to serve – to do as Jesus did – offering help and healing. Surely this would be accepted. But not always. Rejection of good deeds is hard to understand. Most of us have probably had this experience – our intentions and motives misunderstood. And we've been scarred. From that hurt and harm, we no longer offer, because we are afraid to offer what is most in our heart.

Have you ever noticed that people are afraid of what they don't understand? I particularly think that this is sometimes true with those who do good for others with no strings attached. We are conditioned to buy into the cynicism of society that there's no free lunch. With telemarketeers and the such it is for our protection that we be cynical and cautious. But there is still good and honest in the world – and especially there must be good and honest in the church. As the children of God, we represent and carry on the true and honest and heart-changing message of Jesus to all whom we encounter.

Sadly, though, Christians have not always served with no strings attached – we have offered food only if the recipient would first listen to a sermon, we have supported a mission only if we get a tax receipt. Peter's advice is to "always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks..." (vs.15) The answer we have to give is 'hope'. Hope is what revives and renews us in our own times of fear and worry. Hope in God.

Hope is necessary for our well-being. Hope gives significance to life choices and enables people to endure living in a fallen world where pain, suffering and injustice are the norm. When life changes because a virus has run rampant, when tribulations come like a thief in the night and rob a person of their livelihood, material possessions or physical health; the enormity this kind of suffering can crush even the steadiest of souls! How does one survive the big changes and losses of life? Like the Gentile believers of Peter's day and all other generations, living in a fallen world means one will inevitable experience one, several or all these tribulations. We will all experience 'harm'.

But we have hope.

In the book titled <u>'Man's Search for Meaning'</u>, Victor Frankl, argued that the "loss of hope and courage can have a deadly effect on man." He wrote this after his own experiences in a Nazi concentration camp. He said it this way – "when a man no longer possesses a motive for living, no future to look toward, he curls up in a corner and dies. Any attempt to restore a man's inner strength in camp," he wrote, "had first to succeed in showing him some future goal."

Hope. Hope is an inner strength. A living hope is what Peter writes about – a living hope in the Lord Jesus Christ. That's what will keep us from all ultimate harm. That's what will give us unspeakable, unfathomable joy. That's what is our present and our future.

In Isaiah 40, verse 31 we read this – "but those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint."

Some things of late, Covid 19, just being one of them, has made the Christian Gospel forced behind the closed and locked doors of the church – but - is it not time to walk, run and soar among our neighbours and communities sharing that the only hope, in all this craziness, is to trust in God?

We do no harm when we promote hope – and we promote hope because we know and love the Lord Jesus who also passed through suffering, suffering that was for our sake, into victory.

This is the heart of the Gospel. It's the Good News that there is a God who knows and loves broken, rebellious, hurt, suffering people. It's the Good News that God does not expect you and I to "get it all together" first before we come to Him. The whole of the Easter message over the last number of weeks has been that Jesus came and stood in our place and suffered the painful death of the cross – the Eternal God suffering the weight of our infinite offenses against Him – for one singular purpose; "that he might bring us to God."

Our hope is built on nothing less – than Jesus' blood and righteousness."

Thanks be to God.

Amen.

- Give your basket a name/title (i.e. Home Spa basket; Gardening Basket, Bathtub Toys Basket, etc.)
- You may suggest a minimum bid. (Remember this is a fundraising event) The bid sheet will be a 'no touch' sheet!
