- Food Bank Bin from NKP was picked up this week. Another bin has been received and so contributions to it can be at any time.

- ➤ Sunday School lessons and a craft are being distributed to the mailboxes of the regular Sunday School children. Thanks to Sumi, for preparing and distributing these. - ➤ Missons Committee (postponed last week) we will meet on Thurs. May 28th 1:30 p.m.
- ➤ Monthly Prayer Time for the month of June, we will meet Tues, June 2nd at 1:00 p.m. This is a time to pray regarding the needs of the church family and the ministries of the upcoming month, etc.

> Financial Update from the Treasurer

At the start of the Covid 19 Pandemic I was worried about the finances of the church. We still had a building that required heat, electricity and water just to name a few. We also had salaries and commitments to the National Church, Synod, Presbytery and Camp Christopher. We lost the revenue from TOPS and the Church of the Living God. Envelope receipts were sporadic. We did some adjustments to our income and stopped paying our commitments listed above. This was done until we could grasp exactly what was happening. Soon Synod and Camp Christopher reduced their fees by 50% and 40% respectively. Now with a little more grasp of the effect Coid 19 was having financially we paid all of our commitments as well of 50% of our Presbytery Sharing. The congregation began giving on a regular basis. As an example envelope receipts for the month of April 2020 was only \$28 less than April 2019. We are only half way through May and envelope receipts are already 94% of May 2019. I can only say thank you, thank you for making my job so much easier. Even though this report paints a rosy picture for our finances we must not forget that we have a large deficit built into the 2020 Budget. Please keep this in mind as we go forth in this difficult time.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT:

Do you have a favourite story? Maybe you had a favourite story when you were younger that you still remember. Stories can be in books or they can be stories that our parents or someone else has told us. Often, we will listen to or read our favourite stories again and again. I wonder what makes it your favourite – is it about you or someone you know? Is it an adventure? Are there interesting characters in the story? Does it make you feel happy? Do you sometimes feel like you are **in** the story – at least in your imagination?

Jesus was a wonderful story-teller! He often used ideas from nature to help people understand his main message. Do you know what His main message was? **Love.** God's love and he told the story of God's love to so many people. He wants us to keep telling that story. The Bible verse for today tells us that this is a FOREVER story because God's love is forever. Can you think of someone you could tell this story to...? If you need to practice your story, you could tell it first to your mom or dad or your grandparents even if you have to tell it to them over the phone, or you could call Pastor Ronda and tell her your story about God's FOREVER love!

SOMETHING TO DO:

 Write a story. Tell a story. Can you think of a story from when you were younger? If you can remember something that happened to you or your family that made you feel loved and safe – either write that story or tell that story to someone who could write it down for you. Everyone likes stories – and if you have

SERMON: 'Did that really happen?'

There are 2 ways of looking at the question which is the sermon title for today. One is the question of the skeptic, who is searching for logic, for believability, for truth. The other is the emotional question of one who is distraught, grieving, anxious. We are stuck in the middle of that question these Covid days. The whole of the Easter message encourages us beyond just the actual events of Holy Week to the place where the we enter more deeply into the thoughts and intentions of a Sovereign God who wants, more than anything, for us to know truth and to experience His amazing love and grace.

The church's liturgical calendar, with its suggested scripture readings, brings us today to a last Easter season Sunday. We are walking, as it were, with Peter who stumbled and bumbled his way through the day to day life of living with, listening to, learning from, liking some of what Jesus said and did, -- but bold and out-spoken enough to sometimes lash out with Jesus. To the point of denial, to the point of despair, to the point of repentance and restoration, to the point of 100% commitment. And so, post Easter, Peter came to a fuller and deeper knowledge which he later imparted to new believers in his letters. And in the 2 short letters of 1st & 2nd Peter, we hear how seriously Peter took Jesus last charge to him – "feed my sheep." In reading his letters, intended for the fledging new believers and the faith communities who were struggling, we too are, individually and collectively informed, educated and fed.

If anything, Peter was going to be real and honest with those who embraced the Christian faith. It was one thing to remember and acknowledge that the Lord and Saviour who they were committing themselves to follow, suffered and died, but it was quite another to understand and accept that they would endure the same.

Suffering has an unbelievable aspect – is this really happening? Can this be true? Is there a mistake? Why me? Why now?

A phrase has worked its way into the vocabulary of many – "it is what it is."

Suffering will come – that was and is a fact.

But we need to add this phrase – "God is in this."

That, I believe, is the beginning of a new level of faith.

The very first verse in the designated reading from 1st Peter for today states the fact of suffering and then asks "what did you expect?" How is this a surprise? Jesus ended up dead because of his message, and so if people truly love him, follow him and preach his word, then the powers of the world will not appreciate that. The author reminds them in no uncertain terms that their suffering is not a sign of God's displeasure, but in fact is **a sign that God's spirit is with them.** Following Jesus does not magically transform our lives into sunshine and roses all the time, it doesn't take away our pain and suffering, it doesn't assure us of any material or earthly success.

In fact, we may, we likely will, encounter some discomfort or even suffering as a direct result of our faith. The form it takes may vary from generation to generation, from where you live to who you live with or among. That may be suffering in the context of strong disagreements within your family circle. It may be the suffering of ridicule, of patronizing, of sympathy. Yet the 'don't be surprised' kind of suffering is also just part of a broken world where lifestyle, environment, social issues contribute to the propensity for disease.

Suffering is no respecter of persons.

Yet Peter's letter tells us that we should rejoice, that there is blessing in suffering.

One benefit of opposition in the face of us living out our faith, or in the confrontation with a physical or emotional battle is that we are forced to defend and articulate clearly what we believe, which can strengthen our faith. For at such times, we find comfort in knowing we are not alone, in believing moreso that Jesus story of suffering is one in which we participate – in *all* of Jesus' story – even to the very end - resurrection and glory!

That is encouraging, comforting, meaningful, hopeful.

Peter goes on to provide some instruction, in chapter 5, to help us cope with our suffering.

First: humble yourselves. Your place in this world is as God has chosen and designed. Know that God is in control – has been and will be. Humility before God is not about being a doormat. Biblical humility is not about self-deprecation or having low self-esteem. It is a recognition that our worth and our salvation lies in our Creator – he made you and me for a purpose.

Personally, I love to recall a quote of Eric Liddell, the Scottish Olympic Gold Medalist runner in the 1924 Olympics — "In the dust of defeat as well as the laurels of victory there is a glory to be found if one has done his best. God made me fast. And when I

run, I feel His pleasure."

God's hand is on you and me – the Psalmist wrote "My times are in your hands" (Psalm 31:15). Consider also that "you are wonderfully and fearfully made" (Psalm 139:14) – and so in who you are with gifts, talents, abilities – you are the you God takes pleasure in. Trust God with your life – all of it.



Second: cast all your anxiety on God. Why? Because God cares! This reminds me a little bit of that saying 'let go and let God.' Most of us are worriers. The idea of cast is to throw. My father, the fly fisherman, spend hours trying to teach me to cast – to cast to the exact spot where the fish were likely to be. When I read cast my anxiety, I envision throwing the line of my worries to God. The theologian Alan Stibbs writes a wonderful response to this verse. "We cannot throw away our troubles," he says. We cannot run away from our problems or pretend they don't exist. "But we can get rid of the anxiety that is caused by our troubles. We can refuse to be burdened down by care. We can reject the kind of worry that disturbs our peace and distracts our mind." What we do instead is to turn to God. We pray and believe God cares. Think about that for just a moment – **God cares!** (*Take a minute right now and in silence repeat that phrase a few times*). In Matthew 6 we hear Jesus speak and teach about how much He cares – he says consider the lilies of the field and the sparrows of the air, He knows what they need, He cares about them – how much more He cares for you and me!

Third: Discipline yourselves, keep alert! Why? Because evil is real. As real as a prowling lion. And as sneaky. If you watch nature shows on T.V. you may have some

idea that a lion may watch its prey during daylight hours, but only stalks when it is dark enough or when there is enough tall grass not to be detected before pouncing in for the kill.

If we know there's lions in the area, we best keep alert. Peter tells us to keep alert about our spiritual life. The devil wants to undo all that we've done. He



wants to break down our habits and our spiritual disciplines. He wants to interfere in our relationship with God. He wants to pull us away from the nurturing arms of the church, where our faith is sustained. He wants to 'undo us' – make us doubt, cause us to drift away, discourage us. So, watch yourself so you can remain steadfast in your faith.

This teaching though turns us back to Peter's phrase 'after suffering'. What will come after suffering? – well one confidence must be that learn and maintain that 'God is in this'!

Peter wrote his letter as one who had also suffered. Think of the times you stopped short with that bewildering question – 'did that really happen?'

Yes, Jesus had to walk through suffering, the disciples, the early church walked through suffering – and so we will also. Even though we have counsel here to help us cope, the more important teaching is what God will do.

And this is what God promises...He will...

Restore.

Support.

Strengthen.

Establish.

In today's Gospel that's what Jesus, just before his death, prayed for his disciples and also for each one of us. When we read in John 17 what we call the high priestly prayer, we are listening in to what's on Jesus heart. We are reminded that we are the beloved ones for whom Jesus prays. We hear a blessing of loving-kindness spoken aloud, one that connects the disciples to one another and that will carry them through all the suffering that will come. Jesus pleads for them and for us - for

our protection and unity because his love for us is so great. And in that love, we can have confidence – whatever happens – in the world, in our communities, in our families, in our bodies. That's the story of love we are meant to share – to tell that old old story of Jesus and His love.

I close with this powerful conclusion by John Stott, an English Anglican priest, theologian and author, he said: "pain is real. Suffering is real. But the cross is also real. I could never myself believe in God if it were not for the cross. In the real world of pain, how could one worship a God who was immune to it? I turn to that lonely, twisted, tortured figure on the cross, nails through hands and feet, back lacerated, limbs wrenched, brow bleeding from thorn-pricks, mouth dry and intolerably thirsty, plunged in God-forsaken darkness. **That is the God for me**. He set aside his immunity to pain. He entered our world of flesh and blood, tears and death."

My friends, that really happened.

This is our God and this God is for you and me and he is with us in everything!

Thanks be to God. Amen.
