
Norman Kennedy Presbyterian Church **May 3, 2020**

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT:

- Have you played the game called 'Follow the Leader'? Who do you prefer to be the leader or the follower?
- When you are the follower, what makes it hard to 'follow'?

- Can you think of actions that the leader might do that are hard for you to follow? What about the times when the leader gives you a whole lot of instructions all at once?
- Jesus wants to be our Leader. He uses different names for Leader sometimes.
 Maybe it is our Guide, Our Guardian, Our Shepherd. And Jesus gives us instructions He wants us to follow. Can you think of some of those instructions?
- Someone reminded me that one of those instructions is that we should go to church to worship with all God's people but that is a hard instruction to follow when we have a coronavirus in our world and we have been told by the Government of our land to stay home and to not have large meetings. So that's why we can't follow that instruction just now. But let's pray every day that soon we can follow Jesus again by coming to church.
- Today, with your family members, play 'Follow the Leader' and think of adding some easy instructions and then add some hard ones so we will remember that being a follower of Jesus is both easy and hard – we just have to commit to keep following!

and no deceit was found in his mouth."[a]



SERMON: 'Shepherd of My Soul'

My High School yearbook was titled 'Remember When'. Even with the help of the pictures, there is much in it and quite a number of the people who I do not remember. Afterall it was a long time ago. But I find it strange what I do remember. Regardless of when it happened, there are



sometimes the smallest of details about something or someone that comes back to my memory. That was the case for me this week – leading up to this weekend. Five years ago, almost to the day, on a flight to New Brunswick I read a book titled 'Soul Keeping' by John Ortberg. My soul was disturbed, my mind was reminiscing, my heart was breaking because that flight was taking me to the deathbed of my father. And my

memories were of all the outdoor places – the Miramichi river, the brooks, the woods (in the fall hunting season especially), the pasture and other fields where I walked and talked, rode on horseback with my father. As I opened the book, I was drawn into the prologue for it was all about a stream – a clean cool refreshing stream that made its way from a high place down to the villages where people could enjoy its refreshments. The stream was under the supervision of an old man who kept it clear of debris. Until – until government officials assumed there was no need for a 'stream-keeper' and there was no money to continue such a role -

henceforth the stream could look after itself. However, soon the water became undrinkable, unattractive, murky and messy. And in hindsight, it was revealed that the stream indeed needed a KEEPER.

And Ortberg writes – "the stream is your soul. And you are the keeper."

I enjoyed reading this book. I was taken in by the 'stream' analogy at the beginning – a stream, a brook, a river or maybe just a small branch of a river like the one near my father's camp which has always given me pause to reflect of the meandering movements of my life – especially my soul. I was also challenged by this book and felt its content worthy of a group study. A few of the NKP congregation entered into that study with me over a 6 week period. For myself, I knew that my soul needed attention – and in our group study we focused of course on what it means to pay attention to our souls. The title 'Soul Keeper', the analogy, the easy to read style, the probing and prodding it did for my thinking has made this book one of my favourites. It caused me to pay attention to the needs of my soul. Ortberg said "the soul is like an inner stream of water that gives strength, direction and harmony to every area of life." I wanted more of all 3 of those things – strength, direction and harmony.

Early in this past week, I began my study for today's message. And I realized, despite reading a book and studying about soul keeping, that I am a very inadequate soul keeper. But moreso, I realized that I don't even need to take on that role. That doesn't mean I don't have to pay attention to my soul – but, what a relief for I found that Jesus is called - "the Shepherd and Overseer (Keeper) of my soul!' In other words, Jesus is offering to the be my soul-keeper! And he'll be that for you as well.

When you come to know Jesus, trust Him, and place yourself into His loving care, you can be confident that He will shepherd, oversee, and keep you and keep your soul.

To communicate this to you and me Jesus uses shepherd and sheep imagery.

We have come to a Sunday the church still tells us is in the Easter season. The scripture passages for today point us to Jesus teaching and also Peter's commentary on why and how and for what purpose we need a Shepherd. This is a post Easter reflection because after Jesus' death, his followers certainly became like sheep without a shepherd. Over the last 2 Sundays we read about and talked about the disciples – those who loved and followed Jesus the most – but they were, since His death and even knowing about His resurrection – they were the ones hiding in fear, at loose ends, uncertain, unbelieving, unmotivated.

The Christian church began to designate this Sunday as 'Good Shepherd' Sunday for the very purpose that being reminded of Jesus' teaching and image of Himself as shepherd will strengthen us to be the church.

In today's Gospel Reading from the tenth chapter of John, Jesus alludes to the methods for herding sheep and preventing sheep rustling back in Bible times, the same way it's still done in the Bible lands today.

During the daytime, the shepherds take the sheep out to graze in the countryside. A typical flock has from 20 to 500 head. The shepherd is usually a young boy, preferably a member of the family. For large flocks an older man may be the head shepherd, assisted by children as under-

shepherds.

The shepherd's job description is best described as we read about it in Psalm 23. With the help of a sheepdog (often) he leads the sheep to good pasture, protects them from predators and rustlers, guides them to water, looks after their hurts and wounds, and, most important, keeps any of the sheep from wandering and straying from the flock. In using Psalm 23 and also Isaiah's commentary that sheep are prone to wander and to stray away – and especially Isaiah's phrase "all we like sheep" – well we then often have the full list of all the ways we are like those dumb animals. Describing sheep and reminding people that we are all like **sheep** is a fun thing to do for preachers -it's how we get our jabs in - and so we draw attention to those sheep descriptors like dumb, witless, unsuspecting, powerless, directionless, passive, straying, - yet our thoughts about lambs is entirely different. They are soft, pure, innocent, sweet, meek, clean, gentle. But since I have no real-life experiences with sheep or lambs – and I don't think many of us do - it's probably best that we be cautious about our labels.

Although, in searching out descriptions I did find this "Sheep may be dumb, but they are valued. Traders value sheep for clothing, diners eat them for gourmet and pilgrims offer them for sacrifice. Mutton comes from sheep about three years old raised in the open country; rack of lamb comes from lambs under a year old - best reared under shelter; and sheep milk generally costs 3-4 times the price of cow milk. Today people have been known to clone them, raise them like children and even use them ingeniously in the country to cut grass, devour weeds and control brush." So there you have it — sheep are definitely worth much more than we may have thought.

And in that consideration, when Jesus used the sheep analogy — we can be confident that we who are called 'the sheep of his pasture' —well - we are indeed valuable in God's sight! So valuable that a good shepherd will lay down his life for the sheep. Yes, that means a shepherd, any ordinary shepherd, he or she will die to protect and provide for their sheep.

And that is exactly what the Easter season tells us. That is why the Church draws us to this passage. We have been given a Good Shepherd – Jesus came to be the One who would love us so much – we who are and have been undeserving, misguided, reckless, stubborn – yet Jesus our Good Shepherd sought for us, rescued us, provided for us, and saved us by laying down His life for us. Jesus, our Good Shepherd gave us a secure place within the fold of God. That's why Peter writes – "You were like sheep going astray, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls."

The 'Shepherd' image of Jesus and us as 'his sheep' is so rich in its depth and meaning. It is possibly the most written about in poetry and song lyrics — if there are only a few Christian hymns that are still common in the secular world at times of crisis and death, 'The Lord's My Shepherd' is one of them.



If there is an image from the Bible that we convey to our children, it is the most often a picture of Jesus with a little lamb in his arms. Here at NKP, we call our youngest Sunday School program 'Little Lambs'. Many artists have provided a rendition of this image. As comforting as that image is, another artist has given a rendition more suited to most of us as adults.

It is a more rugged scene which depicts the shepherd with the weight of an adult sheep on his shoulders. The approximate weight might be 125-130 lbs. In this 2nd print it is also notable that the shepherd has a scarf around his head and neck to reduce the discomfort of bearing a hot, filthy and heavy sheep on his back for the long journey home. A shepherd wrote this about sheep: "Sheep are sticky with lanolin, smelly, loaded with

dirt." Could that be us in our lost, sinful state?

Yes, our Good Shepherd values us, rescues us, carries us, saves us – even when we have been 'loaded with dirt' (i.e. sin)!

Jesus was a master teacher. In living with the disciples, talking with them, teaching them, showing them and those who gathered on hillsides and seashores and it was these illustrations and lessons which would come back to their memories as his followers struggled to make sense of the crucifixion and the resurrection.

The second reading today was from Peter – Peter as we know him from the Gospels tended to be difficult and impulsive despite being passionate and mostly faithful. Peter who denied his Lord one day and 2 days later could not run fast enough to be the first to see an empty tomb. Peter who regretted and repented and was restored and reaffirmed by Jesus on the seashore post- resurrection. To Peter, Jesus used shepherd language – shepherd language with the former fisherman even as he sat on the seashore with him eating fish. And Jesus said to Peter - "Feed my lambs"; "tend my sheep"; "feed my sheep".

So, this same Peter, in his letter to the early churches, and to us, reminds us that we have needed and always will need a 'Shepherd and Overseer' (or in some translations 'a Bishop') of our soul. What does that mean?

I believe this means not only do we have a Good Shepherd who sought us, found us, rescued us, saved us, placed us securely in the fold of God's people. But we also have in Jesus an Overseer (another name is 'bishop' meaning one who guards) and so Jesus continues to direct us to live out this Gospel as worship and witness to such great salvation that has been ours since we first believed. A truly a soul-keeping kind of job.

This is the soul-keeper I need. The One who reminds me that I am His forever, the One who satisfies my thirst from the stream of His Word, the One who keeps me, guards me, fills me, restores me.

And for that, all I can now say is...

Bless the Lord O my Soul and may I never forget all His benefits!

He keeps my soul! He will keep yours also!

Dear Jesus, we confess that we have had times of wandering away – away from you, away from the scriptures, away from fellowship with each other. We have done so and probably thought no one noticed. But You did – you notice when we stray and your heart breaks. You, O God, time and time again seek for us, find us, forgive us, heal us, and tell us again and again how much you love us. Shepherd of our souls we thank you, praise you, and commit ourselves again to come under your care and guidance. That care is often provided as we care and share with each – when we have pastors and friends who remind us, encourage us, prod and poke us until we return to the fold and enjoy the safety and nourishment it provides. Heavenly Father bring to our memory this day those who have shepherded us – and we give you thanks for them. Thank you for those who have been guardians and overseers to us in our faith journeys. May we each in a moment of silence offer thanks for those who have 'shepherded' us... (silence – 30 seconds)

The sheep-fold (that being the church) of our current time feels empty when we are not with each other. We are 'herd' creatures – we are meant to be with each – you created us to be community and family with each other. In the efforts to control and prevent a virus which can kill, we have all become individuals shutting out the world. Lord Jesus, show us another way even as we exercise the needed cautions – we thank you for technology that gives ways of connecting. We thank you for the creativity we see when people post messages and pictures in their windows, when people stand apart but offer words of greeting and strength, when people wave, when people use their phones to hear another's voice, when people deliver food or necessities door to door or to places in great need like shelters or the Food Bank, when people make masks and offer them free of charge, when people keep a positive spirit and smile... Help us to continue to reach out in such ways. We pray also today for those who are guiding our country, our province through this epidemic. We pray that as information is gathered, as policies are set and plans made that wisdom would be evident – that confidence would replace fear – that lessons learned and habits formed during the the Covid crisis will become a more thoughtful and careful way to live – that appreciation of those who have always provided medical and health care support would become the norm – that neighbourliness seen now would continue - that faith, a return to faith, a recognition that people need the Lord would be instilled in us – that prayers for

health and safety – for ourselves, for our world would be always on our lips. Lord God, there seems to be much to learn in these days, may we have ears to hear, and hearts to believe. Be pleased O God to hear these our prayers which we bring to you this day – and with this prayer as we were taught by our Lord Jesus -

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.
